When WISH members looked ahead in March to the deliberations for another exciting grant year, they probably never dreamed what the distant, intervening months would bring. The grant committee, with leadership from Shepherd University Foundation Executive Vice President Monica Lingenfelter and Director of Donor Relations Meg Peterson, adjusted the typical process quickly, limiting access to one another and to the applicants. Committee meetings and site visits became virtual. Hindsight has taken over now; we are declaring survival and victory because WISH members' 20/20 visual sharpness has given us five grant winners that range from purchasing lab equipment to assisting with payroll and family food expenses. "Foresight, hindsight, oversight" are all words with pandemic significance, but the word "insight" is probably the most valuable word that WISH members can apply to their 20/20 experience.

2020 Grant Award Recipients

The 2020 WISH grant awards were presented to three nonprofits totaling \$29,835 each and two Shepherd Learning Projects totaling \$35,375 each.

Shepherd Learning Project Winner: School of Education Collaborative Technology Innovations

The Shepherd University School of Education's Collaborative Technology Innovations initiative is one of two Shepherd Learning Project grant recipients for 2020. Headed by Dr. Jennifer Penland, the initiative will provide an updated space for student teachers to receive appropriate technology training for real-world application, especially in a growing virtual teaching environment. The WISH Shepherd Learning Project grant will be used to update the laboratory space through the purchase of Apple TVs, MacBooks, Chromebooks, Swivel Bundles, and iPads.

"There is no better instructional venue than to provide students with a collaborative space model in which they may practice such requirements between and among each other before exiting as highly marketable, certified teachers. Shepherd Learning Project Winner: Chemistry Department Instrumentation for Success

Chemistry students, including chemistry majors/minors, most science majors, pre-med and nursing students, are engaged in hands-on laboratory experiments that few other universities can offer– small lab sizes with experienced professors performing the labs alongside them. Because technology, particularly instrumentation, changes at such a rapid pace, new state-of-theart equipment is needed in the teaching labs to better prepare Shepherd students for direct-entry into the workplace or graduate/ professional school. The WISH funds will be used to upgrade the equipment in the chemistry lab. This one-time request will provide updated equipment that is smaller, more portable and tied to existing technology.

"The chemistry department is so grateful to WISH for this funding opportunity for student laboratory instruments which will be used to train future scientists now and for years to come. In chemistry, there is a gender gap between women and men, especially beyond the bachelor's level where men earn around twice as many graduate degrees than women. I am excited that students will see the women of Shepherd investing in their education and hope it will inspire them to help fund the future."

Community Nonprofit Winner: A Farm Less Ordinary

A Farm Less Ordinary provides employment opportunities for intellectually or developmentally disabled teens (or older) to work as "growers" at the farm located in Bluemont, Virginia. The farm was developed by owners and founders Maya Wechsler and Greg Masucci as a way to provide job experiences for their disabled son, and others, who find few job training or employment possibilities. The WISH grant will provide monies displaced by COVID-19 that will allow for payroll throughout the growing season and continue operations through 2023 and beyond.

"The intellectual/developmental (ID/DD) disability community currently suffers from an unemployment rate of over 80% in the United States. Thanks to this generous grant from WISH, A Farm Less Ordinary will employ adults with ID/DD as growers, working with them to develop good habits, social skills, and workplace behaviors that they will use in a variety of workplaces over the course of their lives. Thank you for helping us transform lives and give these people a stepping stone from school to employment."

Community Nonprofit Winner: Catholic Charities

Catholic Charities is a social services organization run with a focus on inclusivity in regard to the clients they serve, mainly working with low-income and homeless individuals. The WISH grant will allow the Martinsburg office to renovate a first floor space into a handicapaccessible laundry and shower facility. This will help alleviate demands for services, which have increased during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Individuals and families who are living in poverty struggle to meet their basic needs, including doing laundry and taking a shower. The Martinsburg office offers these services on the second floor, but they are not available to anyone who is unable to climb stairs due to physical disabilities or illness. The Catholic Charities staff is grateful that the WISH grant is providing funds to renovate our laundry and shower facilities so they are available to everyone regardless of physical limitations."

Community Nonprofit Winner: WV Freshealthy Bucks

WVFreshealthy Bucks/Physician's Farmacy is a double value coupon program that allows Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) recipients to "double" their money if they shop at local farmer's markets in Martinsburg, Shepherdstown, and Charles Town. The WISH grant funds will be used to not only double the client's SNAP allocation, but it will provide stipends for volunteer market managers and will provide advertising and marketing dollars to reach more clients, help develop partnerships with underserved community organizations, and help share healthy eating information in medical clinics, community centers, WIC offices, food banks, and local schools. "We are in the early miles of the COVID marathon. Our poor nutritional health and food insecurity are making us vulnerable as a nation, especially in West Virginia. We are proud to partner with WISH to make it easier for families to eat healthy local foods while supporting our local farm economy simultaneously."

Community Networks/Bethany House Purchases Vital Supplies for Women and Children Clients



2019 nonprofit winner Bethany House, an outreach by Community Networks, Inc., provides emergency shelter services 24 hours a day, seven days a week to homeless women and children in Berkeley, Jefferson, and Morgan counties. Through their WISH grant funding of \$30,750, the agency was able to address some much-needed upgrades to the facility, as well as invest funding into providing clients with the necessary tools that are needed to sustain housing.

In addition to 20 storage totes for clients' belongings, 19 new beds, 32 mattresses, and two cots for the overflow room were purchased.

Community Networks was also able to purchase materials such as workbooks for budgeting and life skills classes that are taught weekly. These life skills classes teach clients how to create and maintain a budget and have proved beneficial in boosting self-esteem. Other items purchased through the WISH grant include hygiene items and toiletry kits for Bethany House clients; transportation and bus passes for job interviews and to/from work; dress clothes, shoes, uniforms, and steeltoed boots for job interviews and employment; and healthy snacks for children participating in the after-school program.

"The agency has had many success stories that I could share, but one of our clients was really impacted by the WISH grant. This single mother with six children came into Bethany House around the holidays. She had just lost her job and had fallen into a deep depression. Through encouragement of staff, the client began participating in the life skills and budgeting classes and befriended women in similar situations to her. She was able to obtain a job interview, and with the purchase of new work appropriate clothes, was hired and able to begin working within a week. She now has moved into her own home with her children and still sends regular updates to let us know she is faring well!"

Shepherd University Debate and Forensics Team Continued Success in Face of Adversity


The Shepherd University Debate and Forensics team has achieved tremendous success over the last few years as they have competed regionally and nationally. In August 2019, the organization was awarded \$30,750 to assist in three main areas: the recruitment of students to Shepherd University for the express interest of competing with the team, the provision of stipends to the coach and assistant coach, and travel to local and national competitions.

In fall 2019, two top high school debate recruits—Ethan Shaffer and Ben Haines—committed to Shepherd. However, COVID-19 travel restrictions resulted in the cancellation of the National Championship Tournament in Whitewater, Wisconsin, scheduled to be held April 16-20, 2020. Regardless, the team was able to still find success in other ways—they placed second in the West Virginia state championship and took first place in debate sweepstakes for the third consecutive year. Additionally, they continued to do extremely well in the American Forensic (AFA) and Collegiate Forensic (CFA) Associations. Team advisor Dr. Samuel Greene, along with student leaders such as Jordan Jalil, have been active in fall 2020 and are already planning for spring 2021.

Human Performance Lab at Shepherd Gets Major Renovation

As part of the Health Promotion and Exercise Science curriculum at Shepherd University, students use the Human Performance Lab on campus to gain practical, applicable, and visual teaching techniques in the area of health assessment for future clients. Since receiving a 2019 WISH Shepherd Project grant in the amount of \$30,750, the Human Performance Lab was able to receive a complete makeover: new gym flooring that is conducive to daily scrubbing for sanitation purposes, much needed paint work, and a purchase of a second testing treadmill that allows for more accurate and timelier VO2 testing for approximately 200 students.


By January 2020, the majority of the proposed equipment was ordered, assembled, and installed, allowing students use of the lab January through March 2020. Unfortunately, COVID-19 resulted in the inability to open the HPL to the public as planned. During the shutdown, the HPL staff members were able to design lectures and outreach



programs for Shepherdstown Middle School and are ready to begin that community outreach once restrictions are lifted.

"We are an updated, functional lab that is excited to offer our services to the community. West Virginia does not have to rank as one of the unhealthiest states, and our lab is taking steps towards that change, one person at a time, through education, direction, and encouragement."

Semper Liberi, Inc. Creates Ashley House—A Transitional Recovery Residence for Women

Semper Liberi (Semper Li), a Martinsburg-based nonprofit, was established to help those in early addiction recovery navigate through the challenges of transitioning back into mainstream society. After being awarded a 2019 WISH nonprofit grant in the amount of \$30,750, Semper Li began the process of purchasing a recovery residence named the "Ashley House" for female patients immediately following their discharge from the newly opened Mountaineer Recovery Center.

"Ashley," the Irish word for vision, was chosen as a representation for the vision the residence will give to women to see their future through a structured sober living environment. The name was also chosen based on Father Martin's Ashley, one of the country's preeminent recovery programs located in Havre de Grace, Maryland. Father Martin was a Catholic priest who suffered from alcoholism and, through his own recovery, impacted many by helping them establish their own sobriety.

An original house was identified in December 2019, but structural issues proved too costly to repair, and the contract was eventually voided. In late February 2020, the Semper Li board found a home immediately adjacent to the Mountaineer Recovery Center. The WISH grant funds were used to cover the home inspection, appraisal, closing costs and fees, and the down payment. The remaining WISH funds covered home updates in summer of 2020 such as painting, remodeling, and furnishings, and the Ashley House was scheduled to open for its first residents in September 2020.



"The WISH grant funding was great leverage because not only did it enable us to buy our first recovery residence, it also enabled us to win an additional grant to acquire funding for a second recovery residence to be purchased in summer 2020. Additionally, the compounding effect allowed us to apply for three additional grants that will allow us to open 10 more houses over the next three years. These will spread out across the seven counties of the Eastern Panhandle. All of this couldn't have been possible without the 'seed' money so generously provided by WISH."
